Why is soil testing important? Your soil may not hold all the nutrients your plants need to grow to their full potential. A soil test is a great way to measure your soil's fertility and health. Without a test, you will be guessing how much nutrients and fertilizer to apply. Having your numbers right is important because each component of soil plays a vital role in plant growth and health. Our office is now offering soil sample packets to the public, please feel free to stop and pick one up today!

Pickaway SWCD Board of Supervisors Election Notice and Procedures

Five County residents serve as supervisors on the Pickaway SWCD Board. Each supervisor serves a three-year term and may run for re-election at the end of their term. Current Board members are :Bill Black, Steve Hawkins, Barbara Martindale, Clyde Ohnewehr and Matt Anderson. The Board of Supervisors guide the staff and partnering agencies in efforts to implement conservation programs which address management and conservation of soil, water and related resources.

Bill Back, Steve Hawkins and Wesley Ebenhack have accepted the nomination to run for the Pickaway SWCD Board of Supervisors. The two elected supervisors will begin his/her term January 1, 2018. The Pickaway SWCD Annual Supervisor Election will be held from 5:30 pm to 6:30 pm Thursday, August 24th, 2017. Voters will have the opportunity to cast their vote in the privacy of a booth in the foyer of Emmett Chapel United Methodist Church located at 318 Tarlton Road, Circleville. You do not have to attend the meeting to cast a vote. Results of the election will be announced during the evenings program.

Firms, Corporations, LLC's, trusts, and non-residents that own land or occupy land in

Pickaway County must provide an affidavit of their eligibility, which includes designation of a voting representative, prior to casting a ballot. Affidavit forms are available at the District office and on the District's website. Anyone wishing to vote by absentee ballot must complete an absentee ballot application. If voting by mail, the application must be received in the District's office between August 3rd and August 21st. If voting at the District office you must do so between August 3rd and 3pm August 24th.

Applications for absentee ballot will be available at the Pickaway SWCD office between the hours 8:00 am to 4:30 pm - Monday - Friday, and on the website at www.pickawayswcd.org beginning August 3rd. Absentee ballots will **not** be accepted at the meeting. Any questions please call the office at 740-477-1693.

I have been a 4-H Advisor for the past 7 years. I am the President of the Teays Valley Young Farmers Club.


My dad, Bob Black, and I farm approximately 1,300 acres. All soybean, wheat, and corn acres that are no-till or minimum till.

Pickaway SWCD wants to remind you that each of us has a responsibility to be a good steward of natural resources. The 62nd Annual Soil & Water Stewardship Week was celebrated April 30th through May 7th, 2017. This year's theme of the 2017 Soil and Water Stewardship Celebration and Poster Contest was "Healthy Soils are Full of Life".

Soils are the foundation for everything that we are and do. From the clothes we wear, the food we eat, to the houses we live in, every person and thing gets its start from the soil! Healthy soils are important for growing our food. We need healthy food to live and grow. Plants need healthy soil to live and grow. Some foods we eat grow above the ground (like tomatoes), while others grow below the ground (like potatoes).

Sherrill King of FSA, Will Newman of Pheasants/Quail Forever and Joy Sharp of OSU Extension, judged the entries from 147 Pickaway County students. They chose first, second, and honorable mention posters. First place in the 4th - 6th grade category went to Sabrena Funk of Circleville Middle School, the second place award was given to Brock Pugh from Saltcreek Intermediate. Honorable Mentions were awarded to three Saltcreek Intermediate students, Camryn Ross, Jesse Powell and Iva Marshall. Katelyn Folks from Circleville Middle School also received an honorable mention.

Gretchen Search of Circleville Middle School received first place in the 7th– 9th grade category. Second place went to Emma McKibben from McDowell. Four McDowell Middle School students received Honorable Mentions: Genevieve Cartensen, Madelyn Stehly, Rachel Townsend, and Allyson Cotton.

All winning posters were displayed at the Pickaway County Library and copied into a placemat distributed at Captain D's and Bob Evans during Soil & Water Stewardship Week. The first place posters advance to the State Contest with a chance to advance to the National Contest.

- 3. Must be enrolling in an Agriculture or Natural Resources major

Conditions of the scholarship: The award will be used towards the student's tuition and fees. Once the student receives their first semester bill it will be their responsibility to turn it into the district. We will then submit payment directly to your school's registrar's office.
